

#### FROM MORTAL FEAR TO MORAL COURAGE

uring Kol Nidre services this year, I spoke of the need for us all to move from mortal fear to moral courage. I wanted to share again some of my final thoughts:

The world as we have come to know it changed this year. We have learned to make

the move from mortal fear to moral courage.

#### What does moral courage look like?

Moral courage asks us to believe that peace is better than war, that kindness is better than hate, that compassion is better than anger, that generosity is better than selfishness, and that all human beings are deserving of dignity, justice, and lives of tranquility and meaning.

Moral courage requires us to exercise patience, curiosity, and empathy before resorting to fear and anger.

Moral courage requires us to permit others to hold a wellthought-out position different than our own, without denying the legitimacy of their point of view.

Moral courage means that we should not condemn the young people we have raised, educated, and worked to inspire, especially when they are trying to live out the values we taught them, even in their own way.

Moral courage means not condemning our friends and allies on so many other issues, simply because they are trying to tell us that they are troubled by what they perceive are the injustices of the Palestinian people (or anyone else).

Moral courage also means not turning our backs on Israel when we disagree with some or all of what Israel's government, army, or people are doing.

And moral courage means helping our young people not to turn their backs on Israel, but rather, to work to urge and help Israel live up to the values we hold dear.

Moral courage means not turning our backs on each other, our families, our friends, our synagogue, or our community when we disagree with each other.



Moral courage requires us to ask of others what we ask of ourselves, and to ask of ourselves what we ask of others.

Moral courage requires us to actively engage in building the world we wish to leave for our children, our grandchildren, and for the world that will still be here when our personal stories come to an end.

Moral courage requires us, in the words of Rabbi Hillel, to strive, when we find ourselves in a place where there is no humanity, to act humanely.

John F. Kennedy, in his 1957 book Profiles in Courage, wrote:

"...that is the basis of all human morality... each man must decide for himself the course he will follow...For this each man must look into his own soul."

This is the challenge and the gift of this day of Yom Kippur. This is why we return here, year after year, to look into our own souls. To become better people. To strengthen our resolve. To face the challenges that will inevitably come our way this coming year. Together, to not draw back, but to cross over, with moral courage, not mortal fear, and to continue the journey to blessing, and to peace. Amen.

s you have seen (or will see), the theme of this bulletin is gratitude. I considered writing about the multitude of things for which I'm grateful—my family, my (general) good health, my new job!!! And don't get me wrong... I am extremely fortunate and grateful for those things. But, instead, I'd like to focus on the


concept of gratitude and how important it is within communal/synagogue life.

Gratitude and community are deeply interconnected, especially in a synagogue setting, where relationships and engagement are at the heart of congregational life. When we express gratitude within our community, we strengthen bonds and foster a culture of appreciation and kindness.

Gratitude isn't just a personal emotion; it's a social one. In a synagogue community, expressing thanks to those around us — whether for small acts of kindness or major contributions — creates a shared sense of value and belonging. When people feel appreciated, they are more likely to stay engaged, contribute their time, and support each other. These moments of appreciation remind us that we don't navigate life alone; we are part of a web of support and mutual care.

In Jewish tradition, this is closely tied to the concept of hakarat hatov— the recognition of the good. It encourages us not only to feel gratitude but to actively seek out ways to express it, particularly in our interactions with others. When we take the time to notice the efforts of those around us, we deepen our relationships and nurture a culture where people feel seen and valued.

Expressing thanks can also set off a chain reaction of positive actions and feelings. When one person takes the time to express gratitude, it can inspire others to do the same, creating an atmosphere of mutual appreciation. Imagine a congregant thanking a volunteer who helped organize an event. That volunteer, feeling appreciated, might be more motivated to volunteer again in the future. They might also express their gratitude to someone who attended the event, further spreading this sense of connection and goodwill. When gratitude



becomes a central part of a community's culture, it creates an emotional environment where people are more likely to help each other and offer support.

Gratitude also has the power to change our perspectives. As people witness the positive effects of expressing thanks, they often become more attuned to the good things happening around them, no matter how small. In this way, gratitude not only strengthens bonds within the community but also fosters a broader sense of hope, generosity, and resilience. Gratitude is contagious. The more we express it, the more we cultivate a community where kindness and support thrive.

In my 10 short months at Shaare Emeth, I have witnessed this firsthand. We are a supportive community where appreciation and gratitude are regularly communicated. And we can always do more. I am grateful for the opportunity to play a small role in fostering an environment of giving and receiving appreciation which will build up the individuals within our congregation and strengthen



the community as a whole.



## Chanukah, Our Story

Chanukah is the story of a brave group of Jewish freedom fighters that fought against religious persecution and tyranny. In 175 B.C.E. Antiochus Epiphanies came to power over Judea, the home of the Jews. He wanted to bring Greek culture and religion to Judea and used force to do so. Antiochus wanted to make Jerusalem a Greek city. He issued laws against the Jewish faith, banning Shabbat observance and the study of Torah to name a few. His troops desecrated the Temple in Jerusalem by building an altar in it and by forcing the Jews to make sacrifices to the Greek gods.

The Jews resented Antiochus and in 167 B.C.E., a priestly family known as the Hasmoneans, or Maccabees, lead a revolt against Greek rule. The leader of the family was Mattithias. He and his five sons came from the town of Modi'in (Modi'in is now the fastest growing city in Israel, located between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv). The Jews, led by Judah, formed a rebel army to fight Antiochus. The Maccabees defeated Antiochus' army and recaptured the Temple in Jerusalem in 165 B.C.E. On the 25th of Kislev the Jews rededicated the Temple.

On the following pages, you'll find the blessings for celebrating Chanukah in your home. Each night has been assigned a different Jewish value. We hope this guide helps you have a meaningful holiday!

## Lighting the Chanukiyah: Menorah

#### The Right (Left) Way to Light

- Candles are added to the Chanukiyah (menorah) from RIGHT to LEFT but kindles from left to right.
- · The newest candle is lit first.
- Light the shamash (helper candle, usually set higher or lower than all the rest of the candles) first.
- Then use it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights.
- Add a new candle for each new night of Chanukah.
- On the Shabbat during Chanukah, light and bless the Chanukah candles first, then light the Shabbat candles.

## Why Do We Add a Candle for Each Night of Chanukah?

According to Hillel, the Sage, every act we perform should increase holiness in the world.

We add a candle each night to bring more and more light into our homes, our consciousness and our communities.

### The Blessings

#### Every night recite the first two blessings:

בּרוּדְ אַתָּה יי אֱלהֵנוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם אֲשֶׁר קִדְשְׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו וְצְוָנוּ לְהַדְלִיק גֵר שֶׁל חֲנוּכָּה. Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha-olam asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shel Chanukah.

We praise you, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe; You make us holy with Your mitzvot and commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

בּרוּדְ אַתָּה יי אֱלֹהֵנוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם שֶׁעָשֶׂה נְסִים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וּלְאִמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהֵם בַּזְּמֵן הַזֶּה Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha-olam She-asah nisim la-avoteinu u-l'ee-moteinu bayamim hahem.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe; You showed wonders to our fathers and mothers in this season in days of old.

#### On the first night of Chanukah, add:

בּרוּדְ אַתָּה יי אֱלֹהֵנוּ מֶלֶדְּ הָעוֹלָם שֶׁהֶחֶיְנוּ וְקִיְמְנוּ וְהָגִּיעָנוּ לַזְּמֵן הַזָּה. Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha-olam, she-hecheyanu v'kiymanu v'higiyanu laz'man hazeh.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us and for enabling us to reach this season.



### **Eight Nights: Eight Values**

Each night's service celebrates a significant value of Judaism. These paragraphs may be added either before or after the Chanukah home service (blessings).

**1<sup>ST</sup> NIGHT:** *Bal Tashchit* means to not destroy or be wasteful of our natural resources. Let us be more aware of the need to protect our environment.

This Chanukah, use locally grown potatoes and onions and fry them in organic oil. Potatoes and other root vegetables are in abundance during winter, and buying food locally cuts down on the greenhouse gasses from transporting food.

Sign up for composting through our Shomrei Adamah (Protecting Our Environment) Initiative: https://sestl.org/compost

**2<sup>ND</sup> NIGHT:** Leshon Ha-tov means using good words. Let us be more thoughtful about the words we speak and the things we say. Words have the power to hurt and to heal.

This Chanukah, be more attentive to the words you use when talking to family, friends, and others.

**3<sup>RD</sup> NIGHT:** *Talmud-Torah* means the study of Torah. On this Shabbat of Chanukah, first light the Chanukiyah and then your Shabbat candles. When we talk about the study of Torah, we refer not only to the Five Books but to all Jewish learning.

This night of Chanukah, rekindle yourself to learning one new thing this year that enhances your Jewish journey.

**4<sup>TH</sup> NIGHT:** *Hoda'ah* means gratitude, the feeling of thankfulness or appreciation. We know that practicing gratitude increases happiness and satisfaction in life. In Judaism, reciting blessings is a way to practice gratitude. It helps elevate the mundane.

On this night of Chanukah, what are you grateful for?

Create a gratitude jar where every morning or evening you write down one thing that you are grateful for that day.





## **Eight Nights: Eight Values**

#### Continued

**5<sup>TH</sup> NIGHT:** Sayver Panim Yafot means greet everyone in a cheerful manner. Just as your practice of gratitude increases your happiness, greeting people with a smile and a kind word brings light to their life.

Make a point of saying hello and thank you to the grocery store worker or the mail person or maintenance worker.

**6<sup>TH</sup> NIGHT:** Chaver Tov or Chaverah Tovah means being a good friend. We learn about the value of friendship in Ecclesiastes: "two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. If one person falls, the other can reach out and help."

Reach out to a friend in need this Chanukah by calling or sending a note or text message and letting them know they are not alone.

**7<sup>TH</sup> NIGHT:** *G'milut Chasadim* means ACTS of loving-kindness. Judaism teaches us that it's the kind of action we take to help those who are in need that is important. It can be as simple as showing up and making the person feel loved.

Who in your circle needs you to show up?

**8<sup>TH</sup> NIGHT:** B'tzelem Elohim means created in the image of God. Each of us has a spark of the divine in us and, according to Jewish tradition, God created each human being to be entirely unique. Each of us brings a unique contribution to this world.

What is your unique contribution to this world? Let it shine brightly like the candles of the Chanukiyah.






